Lost Property

PAT testing

Our kura uses a variety of assessment tools to determine what level our ākonga are at, what progress they are making, what their next learning steps are, and where they may need extra help. Progressive Achievement Tests, commonly known as PATs, are one of the tests that we use.

There are PATs for pāngarau/mathematics, pānui/ reading comprehension, listening comprehension, punctuation and grammar, and reading vocabulary.

PATs are standardised, multiple-choice assessments. They are designed to support kaiako and kura to understand where your tamaiti is in their learning and what progress they are making.

PATs are also important because they help identify the progress your tamaiti is making from year to year.

He aha tēnei mea te PAT? What are PATs?

Te whāinga o ngā aromatawai Purpose of the assessments

He aha ēnei What they are

- PATS (Progressive Achievement Tests) are a range of standardised assessments for use in Aotearoa for learners in Years 3 – 10. PATs may be one of several tools that your school uses to support your tamaiti in their learning.
- There are PATs for p\u00e4ngarau | mathematics, p\u00e4nui | reading comprehension, listening comprehension, punctuation and grammar, and reading vocabulary. Individual schools determine which PATs \u00e4konga will sit, and why.
- PATs are designed to support kaiako and kura to understand where your tamaiti is in their learning and what progress they are making, and to help plan learning programmes.
- Äkonga can sit these assessments any time during the year, but often sit them during Term 1 to help schools develop their teaching and learning programmes, and again in Term 3 or 4 to measure progress.
- They are multiple-choice tests and can be sat either online, or as a paper test, depending on the kura.
- Pāngarau | Mathematics and Pānui | Reading Comprehension PATs have been refreshed (2023) to be more culturally relevant, authentic and accessible for our ākonga.

Ka ahatia ngā raraunga e ngā kura? What do kura do with the data?

Kaiako may use the data to:

- identify patterns of strengths and areas of need for individuals and groups of ākonga
- make informed decisions about the most useful kinds of teaching programmes and materials they will use
- communicate with you about the progress of your tamaiti, their strengths, and next steps.

Senior leaders may use the data to:

 plan professional development for kaiako; plan annual goals for the kura.

Me pēhea taku tautoko i taku tamaiti? How can I support my tamaiti?

- Ask their kaiako what PATs your tamaiti will be sitting, and when.
- Ask kaiako to explain how PAT assessments work and what they mean, and how they will be used.
- Reassure your tamaiti that PATs are something their kaiako uses to see how they are learning and to find out about the progress they are making in areas like pāngarau | maths and pānui | reading.
- Encourage your tamaiti to give the PATs a good go.
 They should try to answer all the questions, even if they don't know all the answers. They might find some questions easy and others a bit hard. That's totally normal.

Ētahi mea taketake, hei maharatanga Key points to remember

PATs are:

- just one piece of evidence of learning. They are a snapshot of a particular moment in time
- · intended to be low stakes
- · not about pass or fail
- · not intended to support streaming
- · about understanding learning and progress.
