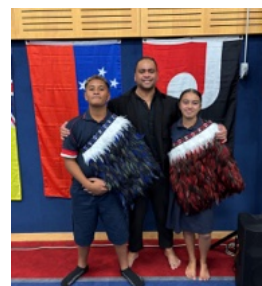

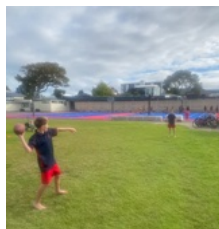
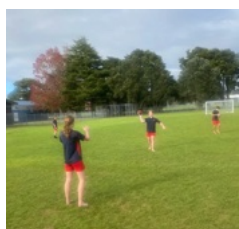


Healthy Active Learning

School Bus

Caregivers are responsible for getting tamariki safely to and from the bus stop.

Please:

- Stick to 20kph when passing a stopped school bus (both directions)
- Drop tamariki on the same side as the bus stop
- Ensure they exit the car on the kerb side
- Walk tamariki to and from the stop
- Remind them not to run across the road

At the stop, tamariki should:

- Wait well back from the road
- Board only once the bus has stopped and doors are open
- After getting off, wait until the bus has moved before crossing

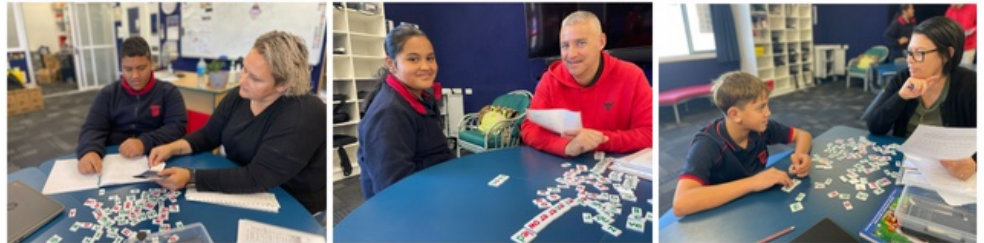
